In addition to the year-end review and election of board members, a garden designer will give a talk on period gardens and how to landscape small spaces. **Nominations** are invited from Members in good standing for election to fill Board vacancies. If there are more nominations than vacancies, election will be determined by a secret ballot. In the event of a ballot, nominees will be invited to give a brief verbal presentation to the AGM.



# HCD: The Learning Curve

The Cabbagetown Heritage Conservation District (HCD) is in its infancy. As more homeowners make street-visible changes to their houses more questions as to what they must do arise. This article will outline the broad strokes of the new arrangement and will give direction to community and City resources.



### In General:

• **HCD** designation means that the essential beauty of Cabbagetown – the architectural, historical and landscape characteristics that define the area – will be protected

forever. Not only will this benefit all of us aesthetically, it is expected that it will also be a positive development in terms of property values.

It's worth emphasizing that the HCD designation does not mean that the neighbourhood is frozen as it is, or that residents aren't free to alter their properties. On the contrary, Cabbagetown residents are encouraged to restore and improve their homes. The designation simply lays down some guidelines for how some of those improvements – **specifically the ones that affect street-front facades** – should proceed.

### Specifically:

To help preserve the historic appearance of our neighbourhood, significant exterior projects that affect the Cabbagetown **streetscape** will now require a special Heritage permit. The following projects are included, among others:

- Replacement of windows and doors
- Installation of new siding
- Construction or alteration of verandas
- Installation of new skylights
- Creation of new window and door openings
- Alteration of existing cladding and/or brickwork

No Heritage permit will be required for the following types of projects:

- Any interior alterations
- Any exterior alterations not visible from the street
- Exterior painting of wood, stucco or metal surfaces
- Repairs of existing exterior features using the original materials
- Installation of eavestroughs
- Weatherproofing
- Seasonal installation of removable storm/screen windows and doors
- Installation of exterior lights.

### Applying for a Heritage Permit:

If you are planning significant work on the outside of your property, it's important that you take the following steps:

1. Contact City staff to set up a meeting with the Heritage Preservation Services unit.



2. Prepare a sketch showing the location of the proposed work on your building.

3. Prepare drawings, sketches or plans of the proposed work.

4. Take photographs of the building, showing its current condition in the area where the work is to take place.

5. Gather any additional documents that you feel support your proposed project.

6. Meet with Heritage Preservation Services staff to discuss your application.

If City staff find that your application conforms to the HCD guidelines, they will expedite the necessary Heritage and building permits. If your application does not meet the standards, City staff will suggest ways in which you could modify your project to secure the permits you need.

### • For local help

The City has appointed a **District Advisory Committee**, made up of a group of Cabbagetown residents and an employee of Heritage Preservation Services, to advise Cabbagetown residents planning to renovate the exterior of their properties. The current Chair of this committee is **Peggy Kurtin**, who can be reached at **416 967 6432**. The Advisory Committee is familiar with the Guidelines and procedures covering renovation in our community, and should be consulted **prior** to applying for a building permit covering external changes to property, and for any advice on exterior changes (such as replacing windows) that may not require a building permit.

**Note on the role of the CPA**: The CPA spearheaded the establishment of Cabbagetown's HCDs, forming contacts with the City, and conducting the research and documentation on each of more than one thousand properties necessary for approval. Now that official approval and adoption has been obtained under the Ontario Heritage Act, all responsibility for the management of our HCDs has been taken over by the City of Toronto, specifically by Heritage Preservation Services, a branch of the Culture Division. The CPA, therefore, plays no role in overseeing or administering our HCDs.

## Museum Moves Ahead

CPA Board member, Carol Moore-Ede has been spearheading the development of the Cabbagetown - Regent Park Museum. Just a concept only a year ago, the Museum has moved forward rapidly, fuelled by enthusiasm from both communities for the recognition and display of our common history. While awaiting permanent museum space as part of the Regent Park redevelopment, opportunities for temporary display space have been generously offered for the work that has already begun on oral histories and collections pertaining to this combined area.

The Toronto Police Museum and the City of Toronto Museums and Heritage Services and the Collections and Conservation Divisions have been meeting with Carol's group; both will be contributing expertise and material for the project. Early research has included the assistance of the City of Toronto Archives and oral histories from residents, one of whose family connections date back as far as 1913.

The museum has plans for two upcoming exhibitions. Superintendent Randal Munroe of 51 Division has generously offered wall and lobby space at the headquarters in their architecturally award-winning restored industrial building once owned by Consumers Gas. Next year an exhibition is planned in partnership

with the City of Toronto's Museums and Heritage Services at Mackenzie House.



## Cabbagetown People - Oronhyatekha M.D.

Mohawk Physician, Victorian Businessman and Philanthropist 1841 – 1907. Plaque located at 211 Carlton Street

ekha M.D. (Peter Martin)

Dr. Oronhyatekha was a remarkable Canadian who was successful as and in Stratford, Napanee, and London, Ontario. both a Mohawk physician, scholar and Victorian businessman.



Born on the Six Nations Reserve near Brantford, Ontario, Oronhyatekha (means "Burning Sky") was also known by his baptized name of Peter Martin. He attended colleges in Massachusetts and Ohio, before returning to teach at Tyendinaga on the Bay of Quinte.

In 1860, Oronhyatekha, on behalf of the Six Nations, gave the welcoming address to the Prince of Wales. He so

impressed the Royal Party that he was invited to study in England, resulting in his becoming the first North American aboriginal to attend Oxford

University. Oronhyatekha's portrait hangs in St. Edmunds Hall at Oxford, to this day.

In 1863 he returned to Canada and married a great-granddaughter of Joseph Brant (Thayendanegea), the great Mohawk chief and Loyalist military leader during the American War of Independence. While attending the University of Toronto, Oronhyatekha joined its militia corps, as well as the Queen's Own Rifles; he also joined the Masonic order. In 1866 he graduated from the University of Toronto's medical school, and was likely the first native medical doctor in Canada. He practiced medicine in Frankford, on the Trent River,

In 1871 Oronhyatekha was part of the first Canadian rifle team invited to compete at Wimbledon, where he won nine prizes.

He became President of the Grand Indian Council in 1874, an association of reserves in Quebec and Ontario, and often lobbied for change in legislation to give support to the native peoples in Canada.

In 1878 he joined the Independent Order of Foresters (IOF) which was a fraternal life insurance company, and he became the first elected

Supreme Chief Ranger of that organization in 1881. He was CEO for twenty-six years. He guided the IOF's growth from a struggling bankrupt fraternal organization of 400 members to a membership of more than 250,000, and a fund of over eleven million dollars. Dr. Oronhyatekha wrote The History of the Independent Order of Foresters.

As one of the greatest builders of the fraternal movement in North America, Dr. Oronhyatekha was widely accepted as a distinguished leader in Canada. His success in Victorian society was founded on the Mohawk values in which he believed, including the principle of reciprocity between people and the institutions they create. While inhabiting two worlds, he remained true to his Mohawk principles, heritage and language.
