OUR NEW BOOK ABOUT CABBAGETOWN IS OUT.

Take a walk around Cabbagetown with your "hot-off-the-press" TOURING OLD CABBAGE TOWN, the first book produced by the Cabbagetown Preservation Association.

Yes, as we go to press with our newsletter - so has our much-awaited book, inspired by three years of walking tours designed and delivered by members of the Cabbagetown Preservation Association (CPA).

TOURING OLD CABBAGE TOWN is a 98 page book about our neighbourhood, lavishly illustrated by pen and ink drawings by local artists John Coburn, Bernie Harris, Dominique Prince, Bill Stapleton and Janiska Zurowski.

To give the book a personal flavor, the committee decided the tap the rich resources in our neighbourhood - namely those people who have made Cabbagetown their home for many years. These stories as well as researched information fill the book with information you will want to know about your community.

TOURING OLD CABBAGETOWN will be sold during the Cabbagetown Cultural Festival at the CPA booths. One booth by the stone entrance of the Riverdale Park, Winchester and Sumache, will be open Saturday and Sunday. We will also have a booth on Parliament St. at Winchester on Saturday.


We gratefully acknowledge the assistance of the Ontario Ministry of Culture and Communications, in awarding us a generous publishing grant.

On Sept. 12 & 13, C.P.A., as part of its educational

program, is sponsoring its fourth annual walking tour. This year the tour will highlight the southeast section of Cabbagetown, an area we have not toured before. Tours will run for approximately an hour, on Saturday, Sept. 12, starting every 15 minutes between 2:00 and 3:00 pm and on Sunday, Sept 13, between 11:00 and noon. The starting point of the tour will be at the corner of Sumach and Winchester Streets, near the gates of the Riverdale Park where the C.P.A. booth will be located. Plan to join us there for a free walking tour of Old Cabbagetown.

After the fleece is clipped in the spring, it is shipped to Prince Edward Island to the McCausland Wool Mills to be spun into yarn. Some of the yarn is then made into sox and beautiful blankets.

Waiting for you at Riverdale Farm are sox and yarn in natural tones and twin, double and queen sized blanket in both natural tones and strong primary colours. I am sure that Judy Spurr, Superintendent of the Farm, will be happy to give you further details.

Something that I must ask Judy; is the family of the McCausland Wool Mills related in any way to he McCausland family that made the beautiful leaded glass windows that abound in Cabbagetown?
